

This manual also can be used as an excellent introduction for people who always wanted to learn how programming works, but were too intimidated or put off by more "techy" manuals.

Emacs Lisp is a simple, complete, and powerful programming language used as the building block of GNU Emacs, a program commonly distributed with UNIX and GNU/Linux operating systems. It is widely used by universities, many branches of the US government including the Department of Defense, programmers and engineers.
